Message from the Headmaster

Tena koutou katoa,

It is with pride that I provide you with a brief report on Nelson College's 163rd year, and my 14th and final year as Headmaster

2019 has been a positive year for the school in many respects.

Focus and energy has continued to be invested in teaching and learning. Our students have performed well above the national averages in all areas of academic attainment including NCEA, Trade Qualifications, Scholarship and Cambridge Examinations; and to support this achievement, our teaching staff continues to challenge and improve their educational skills through professional learning and collaborative mentoring.

This year, Nelson College students continued to make their mark nationally and internationally, in both curricular and co-curricular pursuits. An impressive list of Board of Trustees' medallion recipients demonstrates the hard work, focus and determination by each and every one of these boys; as well as the support and encouragement from those around them.

A highlight of our co-curricular year was the achievements of our 1st XV. Not only were they victorious on the field, but they were an example to the rest of the school of a team with exemplary standards for discipline, comradery and support; as well as respect for each other and their opponents.

In boarding, extensive five-year refurbishments in both Barnicoat and Rutherford were completed and 2019 heralded the re-opening of Rutherford to students. Both houses are now fully operational with domestic and international students. Fell House remains a vital and vibrant part of the school, available for hire age all year round. We are undertaking a gradual modernisation plan over the next few years, funded by the hospitality and hireage income areas.

I am very proud of this school and regard my time here as the highlight of my career. Throughout my vocation in the education sector, I have known well the responsibility of teaching. The task of being entrusted with the care, education and development of our youth has become increasingly important. As Headmaster, I have operated under the servant-leader model with two essential and core tasks: to develop and support a positive school climate and culture, and to appoint creative, passionate and caring staff for all the roles within the college.

Although I am leaving Nelson College, I will continue to watch with interest and pride. My hope for the immediate future is that the invaluable work already started on the Primary Trades Academy / Lamb Environmental Centre will continue. The aim is that the proven successes of the Gibbons Trades' Centre will be complemented by a Primary Trades' Facility - covering vegetable, pip and stone-fruit production, viticulture, forestry and apiculture.

In closing, I must mention how important our very active Old Boys' Association is and acknowledge our appreciation of your ongoing contributions and support.

- Matakitaki Lodge upgrades and equipment funded by the Christchurch OBA branch and Owen Bequest.
- Te Ara Poutama's carved façade which is nearing completion and has been supported by the Trust Foundation and the Chapman Bequest Interest Fund.
- John & Sir Geoffrey Palmer and the contribution from the Palmer Fund, which supports the teaching staff's Professional Development Programme, and in particular, the Rongohia Te Hau initiative in 2018 and the GROWTH coaching teaching staff workshop in 2019.
- Tom Sturgess Fund supporting families with financial hardship, enabling their sons to fully participate in the college's programmes.
- David Robertson, Paul Sturrock as President, and the Nelson Executive for all the support and work around the Scriptorium museum and College events.
- Alan Turley for his research and work in producing another fine book showcasing the rich history of the College
- Rob McKegney and John McCaul for their work with the Trust Foundation and their support for me personally and professionally.

Stellar season for 1st XV

The team has had an incredible season, winning the 93rd Quadrangular Tournament in Wellington, with the final against Wanganui Collegiate 13-7. They then went on to win the University of Canterbury Championship with a home game against Christchurch Boys' High School, winning 35-31. A week later, the team travelled to Dunedin to play in the New Zealand Secondary Schools South Island Championship in Dunedin against Otago Boys' High School, and took this title out too, winning 28-26. This meant they played in the NZ Barbarian 1st XV Championships, where they came out the fourth top school in the country! This is the first time they have attended this competition since 2007.

Teacher visits Stalag Luft III



Staff member, and honourary member on the Old Boys' Executive Committee Kieran Cleary has taken a year out of the class room, and been on a round the world adventure in 2019, overlanding from Singapore to Yorkshire in a 1982 ex NZ Army Land Rover series III stage one 109" V8. One of his stops along the way was a visit to the prisoner-of-war camp Stalag Luft III in Poland, where old boy Leonard Trent VC, DFC (1928-34) was held. He was part of the 'Great Escape' in January 1944, and was the 79th prisoner to escape via the 'Tunnel Harry'. He was caught just as he emerged from the tunnel. Of the prisoners who escaped, 50 were executed by the Gestapo, but Trent was lucky enough to survive.





2020 THE BIG YEAR OF RUGBY

Celebrating 150 years of rugby and QUAD hosts

Nelson College will celebrate the anniversary of 150 years of rugby in New Zealand during May 2020, and will also host the 94th Quadrangular Tournament. There will be a range of events for Old Boys to help celebrate, including 1st XV Decade Dinner functions during Quad, a joint function with all four Colleges, and a photographic exhibition.

It happened without any great intention or grand designs, but it was to have one of the most marked impacts on the social development of this country. On 14 May 1870, Nelson College, one of only six secondary schools in New Zealand, with a roll of only 60 – and an age spread of 10 – 20 years – played Nelson Town at 18 a side rugby. It remained an uncelebrated event until 1963 when the New Zealand Rugby Union finally ratified it as the first game of rugby in New Zealand – a delay of 93 years.

Next year, 2020, Nelson College and New Zealand Rugby celebrate the 150th anniversary of the first game of rugby played in New Zealand.


It began in April 1867 when 17 year old Charles John Monro left Nelson College to complete his finishing education in

England. Upon his return in January 1870 with four Gilbert rugby balls, he persuaded his old school and the Nelson Football Club – both playing the occasional game of 'hybrid' football - to try the 'Rugby School Game' which he had played in England. Monro coached both teams and then refereed and participated in the game. It was played at the Botanics Reserve before 200 spectators including 'a fair sprinkling of ladies and a goodly number of the opposite sex'. Only one of the two local newspapers attended the game. It didn't rate in terms of importance of local events. The Nelson Club won by 2 goals to nil.

On the years immediately following, College continued to be involved with the Nelson Club in local pick-up games and home-and-away games with teams from Wellington. There was no 1st XV until 1876.

In 1875, Charles Monro, the 'father of New Zealand rugby' retired from

all rugby to farm the family-owned farm at Bankhouse, at Renwick, near Blenheim. He later became a very successful gentleman farmer with a

large holding, Craiglockhart, in the Manawatu – now largely the site of Massey University. A man of extraordinary talent, he was a noted horseman, a fine amateur boxer, and was in demand as a tenor singer of Italian opera arias. One of the first European children born in this country, he seized the moment to become arguably our first great achiever. His legacy continues on, unabated.

During this time several College old boys were active in the Nelson Rugby Club. So Nelson College probably provided most of the players on both sides involved in the first match. Two college old boys who made significant contributions to early pioneer New Zealand rugby were Alfred Drew and JP Firth. At college from

1860-63 and known as the clubmaker, Alfred Drew was club captain of the Nelson Club and established clubs at Wanganui, then New Plymouth, before serving as a referee in Manawatu. A watchmaker by trade he was a noted church organist and choir conductor.

J P Firth (1873-74), dubbed 'Mr Rugby', did more to establish secondary school rugby in New Zealand than anyone else. Firstly, at Nelson College as a junior master, then at Christ's College and finally at Wellington College as Headmaster. He was a leading administrator, referee and New Zealand selector.

There are several events planned to celebrate the 150th Anniversary during the week of May 14th, 2020, including a formal gathering, and a community photographic exhibition.

This will culminate with the 94th Quadrangular Tournament to be played at Nelson College on June 30 -July 2nd, with a series of Old Boys gatherings and catch ups. So be sure to mark this in your calendars, and register for this.

Fell House Then and now

It seems that our school memories can be as much about the buildings as they are about friends, teachers, sports days and exams. As well as the imposing main building, there's the hall, that science lab, the old gym, the Headmaster's office... and, of course, if you were a boarder, your House, The entrance to Fell House today. and knowing that for those few school years, more time was spent with your fellow boarders than with your own family.

Fell House was opened in 1964, although its fraternity was readymade, having been at College House (the "Tin Wing") and Fairfield House before moving into its brand new lodgings. Hidden in the trees on the high edge of the campus, Fell was less ostentatious than its older twin brothers, and its mid-twentieth century design made it far more modern.

Fell served well as a boarding house for more than 50 years, with thousands of students coming through its doors, each taking away both collective and individual memories of their years at school.

Over the last twenty years, boarding has changed dramatically. There is less demand for placements from NZ students, and although there is an increasing demand from international students, the overall numbers are not at the dizzying heights of the 1980s. And so the College set about assessing how to best

use these three buildings. Numerous options were explored, with the eventual decision to renovate the two heritage buildings, and set Fell House on a different career path.

Although all three Houses have been available for hireage during the holidays, 2019 has been the first year that Fell is available all year around. With only some basic initial renovations done, Fell had some unexpected tenants in February, with the NZ Airforce and NZ Police arriving to help combat the Tasman fires – a welcome facility for them as a serious upgrade on their tents, and room enough to park their vehicles on the top field.

Since then, Fell has hosted sports teams and groups from around the country - from basketball to judo as well as orchestras and St Johns, at a school and community level. As a year-round accommodation, there is nothing to compare in Nelson. Its location means that incoming groups can use the building



without impeding on the day-to-day running of the school. The dormitory style makes it perfect for teams, with the separate wings able to facilitate different hirers at the same time. Depending on the timing of the bookings, there is also access to the school hall (again, a unique venue in Nelson), as well as the gyms, pool and playing fields.

The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, not only for the accommodation's convenience and comfort, but for the quality (and quantity) of the food in the dining room. A recurring and particularly heart-warming piece of feedback is the enjoyment gained from perusing the old photos on the walls – it gives an immediate history and context for visitors to discover Fell's many residents through the years.

Fell House will always be an important part of Nelson College. Currently, the hireage fees are being reinvested into some cosmetic changes in the way of paint and furnishings – as well as the removal of some of the more colourful graffiti and a muchneeded upgrade to the bathrooms – but overall, it's still the same Fell. First and foremost, the building retains its accommodation layout, so that if ever boarding numbers start to swell, Fell can be called upon to take up the mantle of the "little brother" yet again.
