Thank you to everyone who joined us at our first online Parent-Teacher meetings.

COVID Self-Isolation

Like other schools and businesses across Nelson and New Zealand, we're seeing varying levels of students and staff isolating due to COVID, either because they have COVID or they're a household contact.

From what is being reported to us, I'm confident that the majority of transmission is now happening outside of school. At the end of this newsletter is information from the Ministry of Health about what to do if you have symptoms, need to isolate, or take a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT).

We're trying to stay solely with face-face learning, but are watching staffing levels and our ability to cover absent staff. Currently we're OK. However, if our situation changes I will communicate home to whanau. Fingers crossed.

Q & A with Hamish Pugh:

What University are you at, and what is your sport/team/ position? Quincy University in Illinois, I play soccer (Football) in the Division 2 GLVC conference as a Centre Back. What are you enjoying most about Quincy? I'm enjoying both aspects of being a student and an athlete, good academics were important to me, and I made sure to find a school that catered to my criteria. Which Quincy University does well with balancing both those aspects.

Do you have any advice for boys who are thinking of going overseas to play sport? The best thing you can do is start looking early and reaching out to people to understand how the system works over here in the states. Agencies are always a great way to get the best school that fits your criteria, but you can always give it a shot yourself.

What did you love about Nelson College? For me, I enjoyed how together the whole

school was, I almost knew everyone and was able to make some good friends who I still speak to today. What were your sporting highlights at Nelson College, and since leaving? Playing for the 1st XI football side was probably the best achievement I had sports wise, before I left to play for Suburbs Mainland side and now D2 in

America. How did Wagner and Woolf help you to get where you are now? They didn't help me during the initial stages of

getting to America. But I am using them to help me hopefully go D1 for my graduate school. Is it an easy application process? It's certainly not super hard but you do have to be persistent and dedicated to

where you want to go and what fits your criteria. Along with that making sure you get all the required paperwork does take some time to get your visa in check and all the NCAA form requirements.

Where do you see yourself in another five years? I'm hoping to be completely done with my masters and to be back in NZ where I can gain some experience in Landscape Architecture before starting my own business.

Any other advice or tips for current students at NC? Always give your all when it comes to following goals and dreams, as you'll never know what may happen. Networking is also a powerful tool that may get you into places you would have never known about.

Student Absences or Late Guidelines

Absence

If your son is going to be absent, please notify the College by either one of the following procedures: Completing the <u>Online Absence Form</u>

Phone: 03 548 3099 Ext 851 (Please leave a clear message with the student's full name, year level and the reason for absence).

Late

Punctuality is important and the school day commences at 8.45am Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday and at 9.05am on Thursday.

Explained: If your son is late to school and it is explained due to a Doctor/Dental appointment or similar, a note or explanation call/email must be received. He will need to sign in at the attendance office on his arrival at school.

Unexplained: If your son is just running late and arrives late to a timetabled period he needs to go straight to that class, and his teacher will deal with the lateness as appropriate.

Unwell or injured during the school day

He must go to reception where we will assess him as to whether he needs to go home. Parent/caregiver will be contacted to come and collect him.

It is important the student does not leave the school without signing out at reception.

Leaving school during the day

If your son needs to leave school during the day, a note, email or phone call that explains the circumstances and is signed by the parent/caregiver is required. This is taken to the Attendance Office and a Pink Slip given to the student as proof of permission granted. (Parents/Caregivers are sometimes called to confirm notes).

Leave for non-School related Activities:

Request for leave that is non-school related, during the school year, **must be addressed to your son's year level dean at least two weeks prior to the start of leave.** Please give the dates of absence from school and the purpose of the leave.





Will has enrolled with the Primary Industry Training Organisation (Primary ITO) to gain certification in the Sheep & Beef level Four qualification.

Will says he is also doing the Beef+Lamb business training course, which really interests him, through the Generation Next Programme.

"I'm learning industry recording procedures, it helps me to be thorough and do a good job."

He has learned to use an app to record the drenching history of animals, with-holding days and it also tells him how much drench they have in stock.

When I learned from a friend that Pepin Island were looking for a worker. I rang Andrew Newton the farm director and I've been there for almost two years now.

During that time Pepin Island has been through a sale

and the property has new owners.

Working on Pepin Island with the Newtons has been amazing, Will says. "Andrew and the new owners have encouraged me to take on responsibility and I am now the resident farm manager." Andrew has shifted off the island and is retained in a part-time capacity, directing operations. "Overall I am re-

ally grateful for the opportunities I've been given and feel very thankful and loyal to the island team for their faith in ime.'

April Mainland, local Training Advisor for the Primary ITO programme, says Will showed enormous potential from the start.

"I was busy recruiting the necessary twelve students to run a sheep and beef course. He had to be patient while we got a cohort together for training and he even brought a friend to join in."

April recommends the Primary ITO course to young people looking for a career in the rural sector. There are a number of different modules and industry types where they can get training while working in meat and fibre, dairy and horticulture industries, to progress their future careers.

April completed her level 4 course through the programme herself some years ago which led to her current position as a training advisor for young people starting out. She said that keen, energetic young people who prefer the hands-on training in the Primary ITO system find our programme and support helps as they launch into meaningful work.
