# 11 GEO Abel Tasman National Park Research Field Trip

On Thursday the 5<sup>th</sup> of May the Year 11 Geography class journeyed to the Abel Tasman National Park on a research field trip. We spent the day in the park with the main purpose to conduct counts of native bird species on both Adele Island and Cyathea Cove on the mainland coastal track, both study sites being in the southern portion of the national park. Justin from Abel Tasman Eco Tours provided water transfers to and from the mainland, as well as a guided interpretive tour around Adele Island and the Astrolabe Roadstead. An added bonus was being able to see young seal pups playing in their 'nursery' on the eastern side of Adele Island!

The class was investigating the differences in the number and range of native bird species between the two study sites. We were interested in whether there would be more birds on Adele Island, which has been more or less 'predator free' for some time, compared with Cyathea Cove, which is still affected by invasive pest species, despite the pest control efforts of groups such as the Abel Tasman Birdsong Trust, Project Janzsoon and DOC. Our research would help the class assess the effectiveness of the management of pests such as rats, stoats and possums in the national park.

We were treated to a day of spectacular weather, which made conducting research a very pleasant experience for all concerned! From a research point of view, it was helpful that the general conditions were fairly consistent throughout the day. It was great to get to know this group of students





throughout the trip and I was impressed by their focus and level of interest. The students thoroughly enjoyed being out of the classroom, learning about the protection of native birds in a practical and relevant way. The primary data collected during the field trip will be used by the students to write an internal assessment in the form of a research report, which they have begun writing this week back in class.

My thanks go to Simon Powrie, who is teaching the Year 11 Geography class this year, for inviting me along and allowing me to work with his class. I think the teachers on the trip perhaps got as much out of 'a day in the park' as the students did!

## School Office – Medication

The school office (Reception Staff) are our first aiders for students. They are there to attend to basic care of student's needs. This includes the care of minor wounds, paracetamol, antihistamines, and ibuprofen. They will call parents if a student is unwell and needs to go home.

They do not carry any **prescription medication**, so if your son is on any prescription medication, he will need to carry it with him or give it to reception who are able to hold for him. This includes medication for asthma.

Importantly, please keep the school updated with any new medical condition, by contacting your son's dean.

## Absence

If your son is going to be absent, please notify the College by either one of the following procedures:

## Late

Punctuality is important and the school day commences at 8.45am Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday and at 9.05am on Thursday.

**Explained:** If your son is late to school and it is explained due to a Doctor/Dental appointment or similar, a note or explanation call/email must be received. He will need to sign in at the attendance office on his arrival at school. **Unexplained:** If your son is just running late and arrives late to a timetabled period he needs to go straight to that class, and his teacher will deal with the lateness as appropriate.

## Unwell or injured during the school day

He must go to reception where we will assess him as to whether he needs to go home. Parents/caregivers will be contacted to come and collect him. It is important the student does not leave the school without signing out at reception.

## Leaving school during the day

If your son needs to leave school during the day, a note, email or phone call that explains the circumstances and is signed by the parent/caregiver is required. This is taken to the Attendance Office and a Pink Slip given to the student as proof of permission granted. (Parents/Caregivers are sometimes called to confirm notes).

## Leave for non-School related Activities:

Request for leave that is non-school related, during the school year, must be addressed to your son's year level

**dean at least two weeks prior to the start of leave.** Please give the dates of absence from school and the purpose of the leave.
