I acknowledge those (staff, students and whānau) who've been and continue to be affected by the storm. The impact is evident around Nelson and I realise many are still working through the consequences. Please contact the school, either reception or your son's Dean, if you want any support.

I want to acknowledge the contribution of many in our community through these times.

Firstly thank you for your support around online learning. We're fortunate to have this option, though after three years of COVID-19 it's ever clearer that online learning is a poor substitute to face-face learning. Our hope is to maximise learning in the classroom and have reduced senior exams to Tuesday 13th and Wednesday 14th September, with many assessments now taking place in normal classes.

Secondly I want to acknowledge our staff who've had to pivot to online learning at short notice. Thirdly I thank our Senior Leadership Team. The team

has done a superb job of steering the school through the State of Emergency and a unexpected fire on Friday night.

Finally well done Matt Donald and the many other students who organised and participated in the community clean-up with the Student Volunteer Army last weekend. I was very proud to hear and read about this service. It exemplifies all that's great about our college and young men.

Dining Room & Canteen

Following the fire in the back of the Dining Room last Friday, we've been working with our insurer and the MOE to assess the damage and how we can quickly return to normal operations. The whole building, including the Food Technology room and Canteen remains closed. However, we hope to be allowed back in safely to parts of the building in a few days. For boarding, we've organised a temporary kitchen that's coming from the North Island. It will be located near to Rutherford and cater for Boarding while repairs are done.


