Thank you for your support. As expected, our young men have responded very well. I enjoy being reminded about the calibre of our young men and what they're capable of. I've been into homerooms and classes, and have been impressed with the maturity and insight of our students, and their pride in Nelson College.

As a result, we're seeing more students wear their uniform with pride, or have a uniform pass when it's not. PB4L is a journey. We don't expect our young men to be perfect overnight, and we realise they'll make mistakes. Hence minor issues are dealt with quickly and in a low-key manner.

For example, if an incorrect uniform or cellphone is confiscated at homeroom or during the day, students will be able to pick this up at the end of the day from a Deputy Principal (Tumuaki Tuarua). However, if the behaviour repeats over several days, then the Dean or a DP will escalate it.
