What's Your Son Doing at Night?

I encourage you to talk with your son about playing computer games and using his device, especially at night-time. I play games myself and have no problem with them overall. They're entertaining and can be a positive way to relax and socialise. However, they're also designed to be addictive.

We adults need to talk with our teenagers about how they manage this. Sleep is very important to growing young men. I encourage you to support your son to not play computer games late at night, nor to take his device(s) to bed. 
We are grateful to Di for all her hard mahi, and the love of the outdoors that she has instilled in her pupils. We wish you all the best for your new life Di. Thank you.

Athletics



Eight boys travelled to Invercargill to compete in the South Island Secondary Schools Athletics Championships. We will update all the results soon. Thanks to Juanize and Ian Hill for being our representatives down there.

Rowing

Maadi 2023 came to end on Saturday. With 2, 267 rowers from schools right across the country, 430 races being rowed to get to the finals of 52 different events, and 156 medals up for grabs - is still the largest secondary school sporting event in the Southern Hemisphere.

No medals for us this year, but watch this space next year with Murdoch Smith (10) and Olly White (Y10) who gained 4th place (double) and Murdoch gaining 6th place in the single.

It is a pretty epic feat to make it through to an A final at Maadi. First you have to place 1st or 2nd in your heat, and then often you need to race a semi-final as well before you get to the final. So big congratulations to these two boys, and even though they didn't get a medal, they will come home with a Top Ten (nationally) pin.

- u/18 single sculls: Jaxon Taylor 13th
- u/15 coxed quad sculls: Olly White, Murdock Smith, George Moloney, C Nicols + Blair Lind (cox) 17th
- u/15 single sculls: Murdock Smith 6th

The boys will now have 4-6 weeks off, and then they will be back into training again late May to start preparing for next season!



Sailing

Our Sailing team have been in Picton competing in the Tasman Secondary Schools Sailing Regatta. The boys sailed well in challenging conditions, placing 3rd in the silver group. The weather was very changeable ranging from very light winds or no wind for the first couple of days to the final day getting cut short due to strong gusts. The team has several new members this year and the regatta provided some valuable experience before nationals in Algies Bay later in April.



Outdoor Education

Year 12 and 13 kayaking trips



Kayaking is a hydroslide ride where you choose the line. In March, 38 students, over three trips, spent two days on the Motueka and Buller rivers. The Year 12 classes started on the Motueka, a prefect place to put into action all the practice that we'd done in the pool. Students could see the relevance of the edging, speed and angles we had spent weeks developing. Whitewater kayaking is a technical sport and takes practice to perfect, and our students turned up with great attitudes both in the pool and on the rivers. Those who put in the mahi thrived.

The Year 13's and some of the more competent Year 12 students went straight to the Buller River, starting at Owen campground. The highlight for these students, most of whom developed a river roll, was padding the Granity section of the Buller River, grade 2+. They also got to see Granity rapid (grade 4), which the students walked around, an opportunity for the future for those that progress in this sport.

11GEO Abel Tasman National Park research field trip



Last month, the Year 11 Geography class embarked on a field trip to the Abel Tasman National Park. Half of the class spent a day in the park conducting counts of native bird species on Adele Island and Cyathea Cove on the mainland coastal track. Justin and Heather from Abel Tasman Eco Tours provided water transfers to and from the mainland, and an interpretive tour around Adele Island and the Astrolabe Roadstead.

The class investigated differences in the number and range of native bird species between locations. We were interested in whether there would be more birds on 'predator free' Adele Island, compared with Cyathea Cove, which is still affected by invasive pest species. This would help the class assess the effectiveness of the management of pests such as rats, stoats and possums in the national park.

The weather was changeable, but groups worked well and kept a high level of focus over both days. The students enjoyed being out of the classroom, learning about the protection of native birds in a practical way. Primary data collected during the field trip will be used by the students to write an internal assessment in the form of a research report.

Thanks to Alex Crisp and Richard Townsend for accompanying one of the two groups each day. Both teachers shared their passion and positivity about our natural environment, adding greatly to the experience for our students!






Learn to Sail Holiday Programme
