Last Thursday, two of our staff (Luke Toynbee and Dan Hanson) led professional learning (PLD) for our staff around the changes happening in literacy and numeracy – changes I'm sure you've heard about in the media.

As part of the PLD session, Dan and Luke got staff to try some exemplar questions. I've included copies of these later in the newsletter to give you an idea of the questions.

The standard certainly is higher, and I believe this is good. Despite claims that computers and the internet would remove the need for basic skills, our young people need sound literacy and numeracy more than ever. To read tenancy or employment contracts. To calculate discounts when they compare prices online. To calculate exchange rates. And so on.

3 Assessments

Students will have to pass 3 assessments – reading, writing and numeracy.

Online Assessments

The assessments must be sat online. There will be two assessment opportunities, mid-way through the year, and at the end of the year.

Year 10

The assessments will be sat by year 10 students, rather than year 11. Students may re-sit an assessment (later in the year) if they do not pass.

Impact on NCEA

From next year, literacy and numeracy will be separately assessed and not count as credits towards NCEA. However, students must achieve literacy (reading and writing) and numeracy to achieve NCEA at any level.

Later this term (week 8) Nelson College will hold its first trial of the new digital literacy and numeracy assessments. We encourage all year 10 students to give these a go. If they pass, the result stands and counts towards NCEA 2024. If not, they'll have another opportunity later in the year, and next year, etc.

Unfortunately, the process hasn't been straightforward. Some problems being encountered by schools include:

- Students can only sit the assessment online.
- The tests are expected to take one hour, but students may take as much time as they need. This is good, but students' computers must be fully charged and have a long battery life.
- Students with bigger screens are advantaged because some of the resources require scrolling on smaller screens.
- A number of schools have experienced delays due to so many students accessing the internet simultaneously, and the organisation of the assessments is disruptive to the rest of the school.
- There has been a lack of resources for schools to prepare. For example, the school has not been given answers and explanatory notes for the exemplars in today's newsletter.
- While it's good to raise the standard, there's concern that literacy and numeracy is the culmination of 10 years of learning, and current year 9 and 10 students across New Zealand may be disadvantaged with a lack of time to adequately meet the new standard.

Changes to the process continue.

The government recently announced that in 2024 and 2025, schools may use Level 1 NCEA standards instead of the digital assessments. However, if students do so then these standards can't count towards NCEA as they do currently. There's a lot to iron out and prepare for. We'll keep you informed about the changes.

Our PLD session last Thursday was excellent. It was great to see all teachers engaging with the changes and how we will all share the responsibility for preparing our young men for success.

Enjoy the questions.



From her aunt's garage to the world stage

At age fifteen, Parris Goebel started a dance group, ReQuest, in her aunt's garage with four of her friends.

Now she has stars lining up wanting her as their choreographer.

Parris grew up the youngest of four children in Manurewa, in Auckland. She loved dance even as a small child, and by age eight was enrolled in tap, jazz, and ballet classes. But she found her true passion when she started hip hop dance lessons at age ten.

By age seventeen, Parris had cofounded the Palace Dance Studio and had pioneered a style of hip hop dance called Polyswagg, which she describes as "combining sassy woman fire with aggressive inner strength." This distinctive style, which includes motifs such as glitchy, full body twerking and caterpillar formations, brought Parris and her dance groups international attention after they won gold eight times at the World Hip Hop Championships.

Since then, Parris has done everything from directing thirteen of Justin Bieber's music videos (5.3 billion views on YouTube) to choreographing Jennifer Lopez's dance routine at the 2020 Superbowl halftime show (watched by 103 million viewers in the United States). Parris has also worked with a long list of artists, including Ciara, Ariana Grande, Little Mix, Rihanna, Janet Jackson, Nicki Minaj, Big Bang, 2NE1, CL, and Taeyang.

She's packed so much into her life that she wrote her autobiography three years ago at the age of 25.

Parris is proud of her Samoan, Chinese, and Scottish heritage and is passionate about helping people to express and empower themselves through dance.

She also gives back to the community, running the charity Sisters United along with her sisters Kendal and Narelle, which offers mentoring and employment programmes for young people.


Theatre Sports and Performing Arts News
