

Student Achievement

While our Samoan whānau celebrate their Independence Day (June 1st) and Samoan language week, we are celebrating one of our own Samoan whānau here at Nelson College. See that little green piece of the pie chart? That represents the almost 70 Nelson College students who can claim Pacific heritage. And nearly half of those students are of Samoan heritage. In 2017, the college kick-started a new and much needed tradition, by establishing the role of Pasifika Head Boy.

Now, with our Māori Head Boy and five other tuakana, or student leaders, we have seven young men who, through manaaki (care), pono (integrity) and kairangi (success) use their leadership positions to inspire, encourage and lift those around them. Last week as part of our 'what would I ask a politician' tuakana speech series, our 7th Pasifika Head Boy Cairo Faateete-Masina gave a speech that lifted the mana of those around him. Cairo's speech may have been mainly for his Pasifika brothers, but we all took something from it, and walked out of the assembly hall feeling just a little bit taller!

Malo e lelei and warm pacific greetings. I hope you are all having a beautiful day.

What would I say to a politician? I would say...pacific people are greatness. I'd say that it is important to not see pacific people as only their struggles or as only their stereotypes because when we see people as only their struggles, we are not recognising them fully and we are not seeing them as who they are completely. As I'm sure many of you do not only want to be seen as just your weaknesses.

Pacific people are; navigators, voyagers. They are leaders, teachers, friends, labourers and innovators. Pacific people have, and continue to put New Zealand on the map and represent their homelands proudly as well. Such as the many pacific athletes throughout sport, or Parris Goebel choreographing for huge names such as Rihanna, Justin Bieber and SZA to name a few. Pacific people are diverse, unique. Pacific people are achievers and they are success

I am a result of such success. I am a grandson of migrants, I am here because of a dream and because of sacrifice. I am not just a number or a statistic or someone who is constantly being failed by western systems, but a descendant of people who navigated the great oceans using the stars, of people who built va'a and voyaged to new and unfamiliar lands.

As pacific people, we should remember this. As should everyone remembering where and who they came from. we should challenge these stereotypes placed upon us. We are capable of so much, as long as we realise the power and potential that we have. Our ancestors were capable of travelling across vast oceans, we can succeed in whatever path we take.

So I want to challenge our politicians, our non-pacific teachers, peers... when you see pacific people, are you acknowledging and attempting to understand them and all that they bring into different spaces such as culture, language, fanau and experiences.

We need to write, paint, sculpt, weave, dance, sing, and think ourselves into existence. For too long other people have done it for us and they've usually stereotyped us or created versions of us that embody their own hang-ups and beliefs and prejudices about us. So, we have to write our own stories.

Cape Fear Adventure Race

Last month a number of our boys competed in the annual Cape Fear Adventure race. Two Teams won in their age categories:

1^{st-} Charlie Ball and Benjamin Padilla Vict who won the Boys 10 -11 Year old category in 1hr 55:36 and 8th overall and Scott Brown and Oran Sim won the Boys 14-15 year old category as well as the Cape Fear Event in 1st place ending one and a half minutes ahead of a Wanaka team in a close race. Well done to all competitors from NC College.

Media Studies





Last week senior Media Studies students joined their peers from across Te Tau Ihu to participate in the 'Censor for a Day' programme at State Cinemas, run by Te Mana Whakatū Classification Office. We explored the ethical and legal aspects of classifying films and games, including the types of content which earn Restricted (R) classifications under the Films, Videos and Publication Act 1993. The facilitators discussed trends in viewing, such as streaming services, that have changed the significance of film classifications. We were then asked to view the new release film *Renfield* and apply our recently acquired knowledge to classify it. As well as an introduction to the ethical issue of censorship, the event was a window into the workings of the Classification Office and potential career opportunities for Media Studies graduates.

Students Present to National Conference of Urban Planners




Last month social studies students James Matthews and Alex Taylor addressed the NZILA_FIRTH (New Zealand Institute of Landscape Architects) 2023 conference. The boys spoke about their 'Walk With Me' project, highlighting some harsh realities of Nelson's urban landscape, but delivering a solutions focussed presentation. With Nelson wages falling short of the national average, low home affordability, urban sprawl encroaching on arable land and with young people leaving for pastures greener, James and Alex saw a need for change. Together with project team members, Leo Derks and Sam Dukes, they developed a vision, for reinventing Nelson.

The boys communicated the team's ideas for people-focussed, interactive urban spaces, bolstering their propositions with survey results which showed a real appetite among younger people for improvement. Those surveyed expressed a desire for more free activities around the CBD, pointing out that the city is geared towards older people who can afford the shopping, dining and entertainment options currently on offer.

For every problem, the boys had a solution, and supported their views by using examples of similarly structured spaces that have been created in other countries. Their vision for Nelson included innovative traffic calming methods in the form of 'asphalt art', proven to make motorists slow down and reduce accidents. They spoke of the importance of investing in civic infrastructure, of building up and not out, of greening our spaces and promoting healthy, sustainable transport options.

The boys' presentation was met with enthusiasm by the audience of 200 professionals, with many complimenting their ideas and acknowledging the importance of listening young people's ideas around the type of future they want. We love your ideas boys, and would love to walk with you, through 'your Nelson!'
