


touch rugby

Last week, a team of 24 riders from Nelson College travelled to Queenstown for the South Island Secondary Schools Mountain Biking Championship. The event was held at Coronet Peak over three days, which covered the three disciplines of mountain biking – Cross Country, Downhill and Enduro. Most of the team, along with staff and parents stayed on site at Joel Lodge, which proved to be a great team bonding idea. The weather also played ball, with crisp mornings and warm days.







On Thursday 15 boys lined up in the various age categories to compete in the Cross Country. All riders were competitive, but the standout performers were Phoenix Lasenby who came in 9th in the U15 race and Josef Houghton who placed 2nd in the U14s

Friday saw 17 of the boys line up for the Downhill which is the glamour event of mountain biking. Downright scary to watch but extremely exciting, this event required the boys to travel to the top of the mountain by chairlift and race to the bottom as quickly as possible while tackling several technical features such as jumps, drops and steep chutes. Nelson College had three top 10 finishes. Alex Merrilees placed 10th in the U15s, Seraphim Gavrilov was 10th in the U14s and once again Josef Houghton made the podium with a respectable 2nd place in the U14s.

Saturday saw all riders turn out for the Enduro. This was clearly the most successful event for Nelson College, with six top ten finishes. Lawson Folly placed 10th in the U16 and Finn Pickering was 8th in the U15. Will Lasenby was 7th in the U17, just beaten to the line by Fin Allen, who came 6th.

Seraphim Gavrilov finished a good week by making the podium in 2nd place with Josef Houghton demonstrating his all-round talent by topping the same podium. Josef's efforts over the week gave him the overall title of top U14 male rider for the competition.


4.0 technology showcase

Learning how to source ingredients, considering the costs and revenues of running a small enterprise has been a good exercise in managing a budget.









With a no phones policy in effect, they also had to consider cash only transactions from week 3, as no bank transfers were possible which created sales challenges.

There was an amazing array of fresh, home made foods on offer including pizzas, dumplings, lemonade spiders, cookies and slices, waffles, sausages, burgers, slushies, toffee apples, marshmallows on sticks and various drinks.

The companies all had to contribute a 15% "charity tax" against their profits, with \$27.00 being raised for Riding for the Disabled - a charity voted for by the

food tech




With the College kitchens and the Food and Hospitality kitchens out of action due to construction work, they have been cleverly relocated across the campus.


