

NCEA MATTERS

There have been a handful of incidents of plagiarism across the senior cohort lately. With the advances in AI, the temptation for boys to take the easy route is stronger than ever. Please remind your sons that time management and open communication with their teachers will prepare them to put their best foot forward when it comes to internal assessment time.

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REMINDERS FOR YOUR SONS

As the term progresses and assessments begin, we will be reminding the boys of the following:

Organisation = Knowing when deadlines are, when pinch points will occur, and what challenges may be presented by extra-curricular commitments.

Communication = Keeping teachers, coaches and supervisors informed of any pinch points well in advance so that they can be managed. There is always a solution to challenges that arise, but the onus is on students to keep the people working with them informed.

Consistency = Working away at things all the time so that workload pressure does not pile up. "Little and often" is a wise approach to take when faced with exam preparation, or long-term assessment tasks.

"Away for the Day" – all students are now fully aware of our phones policy and procedures and have become used to the routine. Phones are to be switched off and in bags between 8.45 and 3.15. If confiscated, phones are securely held by the Attendance Officer for the day and returned after school. If confiscated for a second time, phones are securely held and returned after school on the following day. If confiscated for a third time, this is regarded as continual disobedience and results in a stand down from school for 1 day. Boarders have mostly adapted well and have worked out that leaving their phones in the hostel removes the temptation completely.
