While at college, boys often get involved in things that they don't realise at the time will lead to something trailblazing when school is done. This is particularly true for those technologicallyinclined like one of our newest old boys Liam Goodger.

Technology, and in particular at the moment artificial intelligence (AI), moves at an extremely fast pace. Liam's interest in AI began at Nelson College where he explored applications such as ChatGPT.

His interest and growing knowledge has led him to getting involved in the Nelson AI Sandbox project, becoming its project co-ordinator.





Knowing people are quite wary of AI, he is one of a group of volunteers wanting to help people get up-tospeed with AI, and use it for good.

The newly launched Sandbox at 228 Trafalgar St is a not-for-profit, inclusive discovery space where all members of the Nelson-Tasman community can drop in to gain safe, free access to AI tools and hands-on expertise.

Liam has been instrumental in readying the city space for launch and is one of the helpful faces providing guidance and tuition to people of all ages who stop by the Sandbox.

"We believe the Nelson AI Sandbox is the first-of-its-kind in the world, as far as we have found, which is really exciting. The opportunities around AI use are endless so it is really cool to think that the Sandbox could help Nelson become the leading region in the AI space.

It has also been great to work alongside my former college teacher Mr Brudvik-Lindner, who not only does so much at the college for the students, he is also a community leader doing great things for the city, like this project."

In August, Liam sets off to university in Missouri to play football and pursue a degree in Computer Science, where he is hoping to further his knowledge around AI. But until then, he can be found helping out alongside a team of volunteers at the Nelson AI Sandbox.

If you are interested in having a go and learning more about AI, Liam would love to see you down there (open 10:30-5:30pm on weekdays, 9:30-1:30 on Saturdays).

Our Fine Woodworking teacher Cobus Botes hosted the most recent meeting of the Nelson Guild of Woodworkers. During the meeting, Cobus gave an overview of the woodworking programme at Nelson College and presented examples of student work to the guild - stepping stools and toolboxes.

Originally from South Africa, Cobus' career path took him to both Technical College and Teachers College. Attending well-funded institutions, and being lucky to work with a wide variety of exotic and high-quality timbers stood Cobus in good stead for the high level of craftsmanship to which he aspired. Today, Cobus is a highly respected craftsman in his field and continues to challenge himself and apply his woodworking skills to precise and intricate projects, like these two guitars one of which you'll see comprises a wide variety of woods.





During the course of the meeting an invitation was extended from the Centre for Fine Woodworking for some of our most promising students to take their woodwork to the next level.

geography

During the second last week of this term, the Year 12 Geography class went on a three-day field trip to Rotoiti. The first main goal of the trip was for students to gather primary data in groups on vegetation zones for their research internal assessment.

The second main goal was for students to gain first-hand experience and impressions into the physical environment of the South Island High Country and Southern Alps, which is the topic for one of the exam papers at the end of the year.

While the weather was a little damp and cool, the small group of dedicated students made the best of the conditions and worked really as a unit.



The main learning activity involved data collection along the St Arnaud Range Track up to Parachute Rocks. This walk involved a gain of more than 1,000m in elevation which suited our research perfectly. While we were not able to enjoy the view from the top, it was still exhilarating to be up there and the students enjoyed the adventure!





Other learning highlights included; a field sketch of the area from the Mt Robert lookout, a visit to the DOC visitor centre and a walk over Black Hill (an interesting geographical feature called a roche moutonée, French for rock sheep!).

All-in-all this was a very enjoyable and successful trip for the students, to be repeated with other students in the years to come.

We are very lucky at Nelson College to have such inspiring and interesting natural environments on our back doorstep. Many thanks to Mr. Simon Mardon who fulfilled the key roles of head chef, and general support person.

His renowned 'dad' jokes became a foundational part of the trip, which the students will remember! The trip would not have been the same without his support and positivity.
