The 98th Annual Rugby Quadrangular Tournament
Hosted by Nelson College
June 25th - 27th

Tradition holds immense significance in preserving the cultural and historical identity of institutions like Nelson College and events like the Quadrangular Rugby Tournament. First played in 1925, when Nelson College was invited to join a triangular tournament involving Christ's College, Wanganui Collegiate, and Wellington College, the Quadrangular Tournament is believed to be the oldest rugby tournament of its kind in the world.

"Quad" is hosted on a rotating basis, and this year it is our turn to welcome our "Quad brothers" to Nelson College. An enormous amount of voluntary work has gone into our pitch preparation; sincere thanks go out to our Old Boys community for their support in realising this year's special sporting event. Note that even though the tournament is 100 years old, we will be hosting the 98th tournament. It was not held in 1942 and 1943 due to concerns about enemy submarine activity during the Second World War.

I have great respect for long-held traditions in schools like Nelson College, and there are a number of reasons why tradition is crucial in supporting such a tournament. They include:

- Legacy and Heritage: The Quadrangular Rugby Tournament, having been held for a century, embodies a rich legacy and heritage. It symbolises the enduring spirit of competition, camaraderie, and sportsmanship that has been passed down through generations of players, coaches, and supporters.
- Community Bonding: Tradition fosters a sense of belonging and camaraderie among the participants and the wider community. The tournament serves as a focal point for Old Boys, students, staff, and Nelson residents to come together, share memories, and celebrate shared experiences.
- Character Building: Engaging in long-standing traditions like the Quadrangular Rugby Tournament
 instils valuable lessons in discipline, teamwork, perseverance, and resilience. Players learn to respect
 the legacy of those who came before them while striving to uphold the standards set by past
 generations.
- Sense of Identity: Tradition provides a sense of identity and continuity for Nelson College and its alumni. It reinforces the school's values and ethos, fostering pride and loyalty among current students and alumni alike.
- Generational Connection: Tradition bridges the generation gap, connecting past, present, and future
 participants in a shared experience. It allows current players to feel a sense of connection with those
 who came before them, inspiring them to uphold the standards of excellence set by their
 predecessors.

I warmly invite as many parents, past parents, and Old Boys to join us at the College on Tuesday 25th and Thursday 27th of June to experience all that Quad has to offer. We have a very skilful and capable First XV in 2024; it has been a privilege to watch them play this year, and I wish them every success for this special tournament.

encouraging better behaviour

If you are concerned about your son's behaviour, please reach out to your Year Dean.

model calm behaviour

Demonstrate how to stay calm in stressful situations. Show healthy ways to express frustration and anger.

Help your child identify and name their emotions. Discuss different feelings and what triggers them.

teach emotional awareness

encourage open communication

Create a safe space for your child to talk about their feelings. Listen actively and validate their emotions without judgement.

Teach and practice problem-solving steps. Encourage thinking through consequences before acting.

problem-solving skills

conflict resolution

Role-play scenarios to practice resolving conflicts peacefully. Teach negotiation and compromise.

Discuss the importance of understanding others' feelings. Encourage seeing situations from another person's perspective.

empathy development

stress management techniques

Teach deep breathing, counting to ten, or taking a break. Encourage physical activities like sports or exercise to release stress.

Praise and reward non-violent behaviour and peaceful conflict resolution. Highlight examples of when they handled situations well.




senior dance
