- If you have been offered a place in a hall, make sure that you complete your agreement and do all of the admin/paperwork required to accept your place by the deadline date! (approx. Oct 29th but check!!). If you
  - do not complete this, then your offer will be revoked and your place offered to someone else, and that
  - would be Bad! Bad! Bad!

#### **University Scholarships**

Congratulations if you received a scholarship! Awesome effort on your applications, and well done on being a stand out candidate! We will be celebrating you at next week's assembly, and your names will also be included in the Prizegiving booklet, so please do let me know if you received a University Scholarship so I can make sure you walk across the stage.

#### **University Course Planning**

This is an important part of being fully enrolled at university.

You need to complete this by adding in the papers you are studying at university. This task is important BUT NOT urgent. Get it done before 13 December. I encourage you to get this completed BEFORE you leave for exams so you can park all of your university things and focus on sitting your exams, and getting UE.

#### Registering with Study Link

This is important as there are no Fees Free for 2025 in first year. You need to have completed your registration BEFORE Dec 16th in order to get your fees paid and receive you first payment in the first two weeks of university. This task is important BUT NOT urgent. Get it done before 16 December.

Again, I encourage you to get this completed BEFORE you start your exams so you can park all of your university things and focus on exams and UE.

We finished our whirlwind tour of Japan in Tokyo. We stayed in Asakusa, right near Senso-ji temple (Tokyo's oldest temple). We visited central Tokyo; Harajuku, Akihabara and Shibuya as well as seeing Tokyo's night vista from 350 m up in the Sky Tree.

Head Boy Ollie Morton, recently took part in a successful visual impairment swimming camp held in Christchurch. Organised by Swimming NZ and Blind Sport NZ, the camp aimed to enhance water confidence and skills among visually impaired swimmers, as well as to connect young athletes with role models in the sport.

The three-day camp featured 12 swimmers and focused on stroke technique and turns, with the use of tappers. Notably, London 2012 Paralympic Gold Medallist Mary Fisher joined the camp, leading a question-and-answer session and participating in races with the swimmers. Her presence provided inspiration and motivation for all involved.

Paralympian Swimming NZ's Disability and Para Swimming Participation Manager Cameron Leslie was thrilled with the camp's success, noticing huge improvements in swimmers who benefitted from effective demonstration techniques.



Outside the pool, participants faced new challenges with a Clip and Climb rock climbing session, which helped boost confidence. The group stayed together for two nights, participating in team bonding activities that fostered camaraderie.



Ollie was instrumental in helping swimmers improve their technique. His coaching was praised by Gary Heaven, a parent of one of the participants. "In her first lesson with Ollie, my daughter Laura's stroke improved immediately," he said. His approach made a big difference, especially in helping her master tumble turns," said Heaven.

The camp was a resounding success, achieving its goal of empowering swimmers with a visual impairment to grow more comfortable in the water and develop their skills. The involvement of role models like Ollie and Mary Fisher highlighted the importance of balancing swimming with other aspects of life, inspiring the young athletes to pursue their goals with passion.

Congratulations to Ollie and all those who participated, as well as the organisers and instructors who made this camp an unforgettable experience.

However, with our low placing at the South Island qualifier, we entered the national tournament ranked last, 24th out of 24 teams. We knew this did not reflect our true strength as a team, so we approached the tournament determined to prove people wrong.

Our goal was to compete with the best teams in the country and achieve a high placing. The initial games in pool play saw us narrowly lose three close matches against Napier Boys', Wellington, and Westlake Boys' College. However, we closed out our pool play with two strong victories over St Kentigern and St Thomas of Canterbury College. This created a three-way tie for third place in our pool, but based on point differential, we advanced as the third seed.

As a result, we were set to face our formidable rivals, Waimea College. Unfortunately, we were unable to secure a victory, which meant we would play for positions 9th to 16th. Determined to showcase our abilities and achieve a top-ten finish in the country, we rebounded from this loss with a series of dominant wins over Hutt International Boys', Rangiora, and Mount Maunganui to conclude the tournament. Our efforts paid off, as we secured ninth place in the nation.

This placement is a testament to the consistent effort and dedication demonstrated by all players and staff throughout the Year. It was truly a season to remember for Nelson College Basketball.


