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
Welcome to New Zealand!


The population of New Zealand is 5.1 million people. English, Maori and New Zealand Sign Language are official languages, although most people speak English.

NEW ZEALAND SEASONS AND CLIMATE

The average New Zealand temperature decreases as you travel south. January and February are our warmest months, and July is our coldest month of the year.

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Spring

September – November

Average daytime temperatures 16 - 19°C (61 - 66°F)

Summer

December – February

Average daytime temperatures 20 - 25°C (68 - 77°F)

Autumn

March - May

Average daytime temperatures 17 - 21°C (62 - 70°F)

Winter

June - August

Average daytime temperatures 12 - 16°C (53 - 61°F)

The weather in New Zealand can change fast. Be prepared for changes in weather and temperature, particularly if doing outdoor activities.

Banking

- New Zealand banks are open from 9.30am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday.
- Automated Teller Machines (ATM's) are widely available at banks, on main shopping streets and in malls.
- International credit cards and ATM cards will work if you have a four-digit PIN code.
- Please check with your bank before leaving home.

Bringing cash into New Zealand

- You can bring cash to New Zealand.
- However, if it is more than NZ\$10,000 in cash you must complete a Border Cash Report.

Currency exchange

• Foreign currency can easily be exchanged at banks, some hotels and Bureau de Change kiosks which are found in international airports and most city centres.

Currency values

- Coins have values of 10, 20, 50 cents, \$1 and \$2
- Notes have values of \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100

Pocket money

While you are at the school, we can arrange for you to have a NZ bank account through Westpac bank https://www.westpac.co.nz/. We can then arrange to pay you a weekly allowance (pocket money) at an agreed rate with your parents.

VISA AND IMMIGRATION

Before travelling to New Zealand, you need to make sure your passport is valid for at least six months after your expected departure date.

- If you are studying for twelve weeks or less, you will need a visitor visa. If you are from a visa-waiver country, you may obtain this on arrival in NZ. If you are not from a visa-waiver country, you must apply for your visitor visa in your home country, as early as possible (at least eight weeks) before your travel date.
- If you are studying for more than twelve weeks, please apply for a student visa at least eight weeks before your departure date.

Your flight into New Zealand will be either Auckland, Wellington or Christchurch. The process into the arrival area is the same of all airports.

Complete a Passenger Arrival Card on board the flight



Give your Passenger Arrival Card to the Immigration Officer at Passport Control



The officer will check your passport, visa and Passenger Arrival Card. They may ask you questions like: Where are you going to be staying? Where was your last destination? Do you have any food with you? Have you visited New Zealand before?



After your passport and visa has been checked you will get an Immigration New Zealand stamp in your passport



Your passport will be returned to you



Collect your bags from the baggage claim area



Go to the officer at the Customs and Biosecurity



Your bags will go through an x-ray machine and inspectors might look in your bags



Once you have been cleared by Customs and Biosecurity you will walk through the arrival doors



Welcome to New Zealand!



Nelson College is in Nelson (a city located at the top of the South Island. You will need to catch a plane from the domestic terminal. We will meet you in Nelson Airport!

Below are some items we suggest you pack for your time in New Zealand. Depending on the time of the year you are coming, you will need to bring different things.

Essentials

- Return airline ticket
- Passport and current visa to study in New Zealand
- Travel/medical insurance policy
- Any medication you take
- Laptop and mobile phone
- Adapter plug(s) for electrical items. the electrical supply is 230/240 volts
- A few personal belongings to help your room feel like home



Spring/Summer

If you are coming during our spring and summer months we suggest:

- Swimwear
- Sunhat, sunglasses and sunscreen
- Shorts and/or skirts
- Tshirts and/or short sleeve shirts
- Jumper and/or sweatshirt
- Light raincoat
- Good walking shoes and sandals
- Your choice of other clothing and footwear

Autumn/Winter

If you are coming during our autumn and winter months we suggest:

- Warm waterproof jacket
- Jumper and/or sweater
- Long pants and/or jeans
- Long sleeved shirt and/or tshirt
- Scarf, hat and gloves
- Good walking shoes
- Your choice of other clothing and footwear

Things You Cannot Bring into New Zealand

Some items are not allowed into New Zealand. These include food, plants and animal products. YOU MUST DECLARE ANY FOOD YOU BRING WITH YOU. These items include:

- Meat
- Eggs
- Dairy Products
- Dried mushroom and fungi
- Honey and honey products
- Seeds for human consumption and processing into food
- Nuts, spices, herbs and unpopped popcorn
- Dried, cooked or preserved fruit and vegetables
- Fresh fruit or vegetables

If you do not declare your items, you will be fined around NZ\$400.00 and the items will be taken from you.

Boarding

If you choose to stay in boarding for your accommodation, you only need to bring personal clothing, all bedding will be supplied by the boarding staff. This includes pillows, duvet, blanket, sheets and pillowcases.





Travel and Medical Insurance

The New Zealand government requires you to have insurance to cover your travel and the cost of medical treatment during your stay in New Zealand. Insurance policies must be approved by the school and must meet the requirements of The Education (Pastoral of Tertiary and International Learners) Code of Practice 2021.

If you go to the doctor while you are in New Zealand, you will need to pay for the visit and then claim the cost back later with your insurance company. Ask the school to help you do this.

Please note that if you have a current medical condition, we MUST know about this for insurance purposes.

To claim on your insurance for lost or stolen items, you must have your proof of purchase. **Getting Insurance**

School Uniform

During your time at the school, you will need to wear the school uniform. You can buy the uniform once you are in New Zealand from the uniform shop. The approximate cost of the uniform is between \$300 and \$900 depending on how long you are staying and what you need.

You can buy the following items in your home country before you come:

- Black lace-up shoes
- A white long-sleeved shirt
- A black belt
- Trainers (for sport)
- Any specific sport shoes (e.g. soccer boots)

We are getting a uniform update in 2025. Here is a design concept of what it will look like:

Orientation Dates and What to Bring

We have a two-day orientation programme that introduces new students to the school

During the programme we will cover:

- Introduction to Nelson College International Department
- New Zealand Laws rules and regulations
- A full tour of the school
- Connection of electronic devices to our internet network (Phones, laptops etc.)
- Fitting and purchase of uniform (from the school uniform shop)
- ESOL (English as a Second Language) testing including vocabulary, grammar and writing tasks
- Timetabling subject choices
- Registration for Co-curricular activities Music and Sport
- Arranging of bank account (by appointment)

Students need to bring their passport/visa information, paper and stationery to make notes/complete the tests. They can wear mufti (casual clothing).

LIVING IN NEW ZEALAND

Soon you will be going to school in New Zealand, and you will be staying in a house and town or city that will be different from your home country.

To help you settle into your new home in New Zealand here is some information to think about:



Accommodation

While staying at our school you will be living with a homestay family, living in our school boarding house or with your parents.

International students who are under 10 years of age must live with their parent in New Zealand.

Food at School

- We provide all international students lunch in our dining room if you are living in boarding or homestay.
- Just remember, food in New Zealand may be different to what you are used to always try it first, then if you don't like it then it is OK not to eat it again.
- While you are eating your food at school, watch other student's manners. What is OK
 in your culture may not be in New Zealand. Some New Zealander's think it is rude to
 burp or slurp, reach in front of others, or eat with your mouth open. Try not to. This is
 part of learning about another culture. Neither is right or wrong they are just
 different.
- There is a cafeteria at our school where you can buy food at break time / lunch time. The kinds of food it sells includes: fruit, sandwiches, hot food (e.g. curry), burgers, wraps, potato chips, cake and drinks.

Getting to School

- Homestay after the first day of school, if you are close enough you might walk to school or ride a bike. You might even catch a school bus. Or you might drive in the car with your host family.
- Our two boarding houses are located on school grounds less than 5 minutes' walk from the school buildings.
- We drive on the left side of the road, so if you are crossing a road you need to be very careful— make sure you look both ways! Remember look right first, then left, then



right again....then cross the road.

 People living in New Zealand use different ways to get around – walk, bike, skateboard, scooter, car and bus.



Telephone/Mobile Phone

- If your homestay has a landline it is free to call when you call within your town or city that you are living in.
- You need to bring your mobile phone with you or buy one here. You can buy a New Zealand sim card and credit to make calls and send texts.
- In 2024 the New Zealand government is made a law to ban cellphones in schools. Students are not allowed to use a cellphone at school between 8.45am and 3.15pm at any school in the country. Teachers will confiscate cellphones if students are caught with them on school grounds during the school day.

Friends Visiting

- In New Zealand many students visit their friends after school and in the weekends.
- If you would like to invite a friend to visit your home, please ask their parent/s first and your parent/caregiver to arrange a day and time. It is a good way for your family to meet other New Zealand families too.
- By having friends and going to their houses or having them visit your house, you will
 widen your cultural experience, improve your English and of course have fun spending
 more time with your friends.



Please Ask

- If you are not sure about anything, please ask.
- In New Zealand it is a good thing to ask questions. If something upsets you, confuses you or makes you angry please talk with someone at your school.
- Talking always helps.


